

## **NO SEANIE, BUT LOTS AT STAKE,** AS KILDARE AND CAVAN RESUME LEAGUE ACTION

There was a time, and not too long ago I hasten to add, that if your county was still playing football in August your favourites were enjoying more than a decent season.

In Leinster, from a footballing point of view, it meant you had made it to August Bank Holiday weekend and with it a place in the Leinster Senior Football final and the dream of winning silverware was alive and well.

Now, here we are, all but a fire cracker away from Halloween, and the Allianz Football League is still in operation and, wait for it, the Leinster Football Championship has not even commenced.

Who would have believed it. All down, of course, to the coronavirus.

And so today, Sunday October 18, Round 6 of the AFL (Division 2) throwsin with Cavan visiting St Conleth's Park, in a game that throws-in at 2 pm, behind closed doors. To say it will be strange is a bit of an understatement, but the fact that the league is being finished is a real bonus, and hopefully everything, and more importantly, everyone, players, officials, etc, get through it safely.

Speaking of Cavan and it's not too long ago when one of The Breffni county favourite sons discarded the blue and white of his native county for the allwhite of Kildare.

The great Seanie Johnston, talented footballer, and sometimes hurler.

The entire episode made headline news in print, radio and TV but to be eligible to don the white of Kildare, Johnston had first to play a club game in Lilywhiteland which led to him lining out in a hurling game representing Coill Dubh, a game that attracted a big crowd to Conneff Park, Clane, that included no less than two TV crews. Less than ten minutes into that game, Seanie was withdrawn to the safety of the dug-out, his eligibility secured.

Seanie made his inter-county debut for Kildare, under Kieran McGeeney against (and you just could not make this up) Cavan in an Allianz Football League game, coming on as a sub and scoring a point, a game Kildare won.

The entire Johnston saga, was not a success however, as despite putting in a monumental effort, the Cavan native was plagued with injuries, in particular a hamstring problem, that prevented him from making any real impact, failing to get a decent injury-free run with McGeeney's side.

In 2016, and following a change of management in Cavan, Seanie returned to his native county where he once again showed his undoubted talent.

And so to Sunday, a vital game for both counties.

Division 2 is a very tight division with just five points separating top team, Armagh, from bottom side, Fermanagh. Cavan are in a better place than their opponents on Sunday it has to be said, lying in third spot with six points, while Kildare are in seventh, on four points. However, such is the tightness of the division that depending on this weekend's results, any county, with the exception of bottom placed Fermanagh could find themselves catapulted right up the table.

Cavan's six points have come with wins over Fermanagh, Laois and Westmeath with loses to Clare and Armagh while "

Kildare have defeated Fermanagh and Laois, losing out to Armagh, Roscommon and Clare. Kildare's final game, next Saturday, sees them entertain Westmeath, while Cavan have a home fixture, against Roscommon.

The Lilies, due to the infamous three county lockdown, find themselves somewhat behind in their preparation and along with the County Senior Football Final, just two weeks ago, manager Jack O'Connor and his management team, have had very limited time with their panel of players, and even less with the full panel, but as the former successful Kerry boss said, "such is life, we just have to get on with it."

Difficult game to call and in fairness that can be said about the vast majority of Allianz Football League games being played this weekend. The only sure thing about the Kildare and Cavan game is that one Seanie Johnston will not be togging out.

For either Cavan or Kildare.

**Expectations for the team for 2020:** Our focus now is to obtain Division 1 league status JOHN JOE O'REILLY who captained Cavan to 1947 All-Ireland win in New York had links with Kildare GAA and the Curragh

Supporters keeping an eye on the action from St Conleth's Park today for this crucial Division 2 clash between Kildare and Cavan may have heard their forefathers recall great encounters between the counties in the late 1920s. and '30s. In that era during an eight-year period the teams met in two All-Ireland finals. In 1928, Kildare, led by their legendary captain Bill 'Squires' Gannon, defeated Cavan by a point to win their fourth All-Ireland title. This was the first year that Sam Maguire was presented to the All-Ireland winners. Cavan had to wait until 1935 to get revenge when they defeated Kildare by four points to win their second title.

### John Joe also made a significant contribution to the GAA in Kildare.

He was the mainstay and captain of the great Curragh team of the 1940s. These were great years for Kildare club football with seven different teams winning the Kildare senior championship

in that decade namely Carbury, Athy, Raheens, Ellistown, Sarsfields, Curragh and Ardclough. The clashes between the Curragh and Sarsfields and Ardclough during that decade were the highpoints of Kildare club football with attendances at county finals smashing all previous records. John Joe captained the Curragh to their only Kildare championship in 1948. In addition to playing with the Curragh John Joe never refused to assist a club team whenever he was asked, and he coached Kilcullen, Moorefield, and Ballymore Eustace etc. at different times. He was also a noted referee and he officiated regularly for Kildare county board whenever he was available, and he took charge of the 1950 county final.

#### New Book Coming Soon

The links between both counties was further forged during the 1940s and early '50s by the presence of the great John Joe O'Reilly in Kildare. Few in Kildare know much about John Joe's early life in Cavan and few in Cavan know much about John Joe's career in Kildare. Now, thanks to a forthcoming publication, **The Gallant John Joe, Cavan's Millennium Man,** we get an extensive biography of the great man's life and his many achievements.

The author has gone to considerable detail, interviewing many of the surviving players in Cavan, Kildare and elsewhere to get an extensive picture of the man. The biography covers his childhood days, his school days, his years in St Patrick's College and his early football days in Cornafean and Cavan. It records in detail his many successes on the field of play including his county championships with his club Cornafean, 11 Ulster championship medals with Cavan and four Railway Cups with Ulster. The highlight of his career was captaining the Cavan team to a unique All-Ireland victory over Kerry in the Polo Grounds, New York in 1947 and again in 1948 when they defeated Mayo. The book is laced with lore and anecdotes about great victories and agonising defeats all set in the historical and social context of the time. It includes a fine collection of photographs, many previously unpublished.

The book also chronicles John Joe's life in his adopted county of Kildare. On October 29, 1937 he began his life in the army when he entered the Cadet School at the Curragh Military Camp. He soon gained rapid promotion. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in 1939, promoted to Captain in 1942 and Commandant in 1945. The 1940s was



an important decade in our country's history and John Joe played a key role in the Curragh during the Emergency and post war era when strong leadership was needed.

Above all else John Joe was a family man and he lived in the Curragh with his wife Olive and their four young children. They were due to move into their new house on the outskirts of Naas at the end of 1952. But this wasn't to be. John Joe's sudden death on November 22, 1952 at 34 years of age numbed his family, his playing colleagues, and his many friends in both counties and nationwide. He is best remembered as a great leader, a sportsman supreme and above all else a gentleman.

This book should be of great interest to people in both counties and far beyond. It is published by Ballpoint Press and will go on general sale after the launch dates which have yet to be announced. *George Cartwright* (*author*)


